<u>History and Ecology of the Sauk Prairie Recreation Area.</u>

The Sauk Prairie Recreation Area, located in southeastern Sauk County, consists of a portion of the decommissioned 7,354-acre Badger Army Ammunition Plant. It manufactured nitrocellulose-based propellants during World War 2, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. It was the largest munitions factory in the world during World War 2. The Sauk Prairie Recreation Area contributes important areas of grassland habitat needed to reconstruct and experience a natural mosaic of prairie-savanna-woodland at a landscape scale. Directly adjacent to Devils Lake State Park, it serves as an ecological transition from the Baraboo Hills to the Wisconsin River.

DIRECTIONS TO THE MEETING:

Continue on Lacy and take the entrance road around the far (east) end of the library to access parking near the entrance, (behind the library). **OR** if you prefer to park underground, turn left (north) onto Research Park Rd and then turn right into the ramp leading to the underground parking lot.

Dan Sonnenberg was a member of the Prairie Sands Chapter of The Prairie Enthusiasts. Chapter has made a donation of \$1,500 to SWBA honoring Dan Sonnenberg who passed away in November of 2017. The money is earmarked to help save the Endangered Swamp Metalmark.

Since the Swamp Metalmark was extirpated at the Riveredge Nature Center in Ozaukee County recently (for the second time!) there remains only a single site in Wisconsin known to harbor the Swamp Metalmark. But even that population has declined over the decades.

BUTTERFLY REPORTS IN THE PAST MONTH

On September 16, a Cloudless Sulphur was photographed in Herbster, in Bayfield County in extreme northern Wisconsin. It is unusual for such a very rare southern immigrant to reach northern Wisconsin.

On the same day a **Monarch with** a tag was photographed Neenah, Winnebago County. That Ocola Skipper. Photo by Pam is also very unusual.

In the September newsletter I wrote that "The find of the year may well be Douglas Buege's sighting of two very rare butterflies at Olbrich Gardens on August 31: Funereal Duskywing and Horace's Duskywing!" But just 3 weeks later I was proven wrong! On September 22, SWBA members Pam Skaar and Bill and Ginny Nelson found and photographed an immigrant Ocola Skipper at Olbrich Gardens.

This was only the 2nd time the Ocola Skipper has been found in Wisconsin! Congratulations to Pam, Bill and Ginny on such an important find. (Immigrant butterflies are more apt to show up late in the season at botanical gardens such as Olbrich because at this time of year other nectar sources are waning so the gardens become more attractive to the remaining butterflies.)

Which raises the question: How did last year's Butterfly of the Year (Painted Lady) do this year? Last year there were hundreds of reports of Painted Lady (a migrant). But this year there were only about 8 sightings! The population of Painted Ladies varies rather dramatically. When they have a big surge in population it's not unusual for the Painted Lady population in the following year to crash.

5 COUPLE FROM GEORGIA VISITS WISCONSIN FOR "LIFE BUTTERFLIES"

We met John Crosby at the National Butterfly Center in Texas a year ago. Like many of the visitors, he was photographing butterflies. He and his wife Nancy travel around different states and different countries to see and photograph as many birds and butterflies as they can. We suggested that he and Nancy, participate in one of the Wisconsin NABA Butterfly Counts. So in July they spent about 9 days in Wisconsin observing and

photographing butterflies. They participated in the Mud Lake NABA Butterfly Count, visited Black Earth Prairie, Buena Vista Grasslands, Sandhill Wildlife Area and many other places. They were able to see 25 life butterflies (butterflies that they had never seen before) and add them to their "life list" of butterflies. Here are just a few of the photographs they took:

6 RESULTS OF THE TREMPEALEAU NABA COUNT

I have space to discuss only one out of several NABA Butterfly Counts done in Wisconsin this year: Trempealeau County. This was the **29th year** for this count. **13 people participated** in the count, including the Leglers, Mike Reese, Douglas Buege, Al Sheldon, Judy Bautch, and 7 others. We counted for 12 hours in 3 groups and found **292 individual butterflies, of 38 species**. The best sightings were a **Juniper Hairstreak**, a **Variegated Fritillary** and a **Gray Copper (Special Concern)**. We also saw 52 Monarch's, which was the highest density of the 29 years!
