BUTTERFLIES AND FLOWERS OF KALSCHEUR OAK SAVANNAH Saturday, July 20, 2019

10:00 a.m. to noon.

We will explore this diverse area. Kalscheur is owned by The Prairie Enthusiasts. It encompasses 19 acres and has a wide diversity of habitats with a cold water stream, wet meadow and wet prairie to dry prairie, oak savanna and oak woodland. It has 243 native plant species. We

expect to find Swallowtails, Fritillaries and many other

species of butterfly. (Two years ago, when we first did this trip, we found 24 species!) Leaders are **Dr. Douglas Buege** (SWBA) and **Rich Henderson** (TPE)

BUTTERFLIES OF YAHARA HEIGHTS NEW Saturday, July 27, 2019

10:00 a.m. to noon

Yahara Heights is a 141 acre Dane County Park. It is a hidden gem tucked away at the north tip of Madison. It is located adjacent to Cherokee Marsh, the largest remaining wetland in Dane County. Yahara Heights has over 3,000 feet of water frontage, spectacular wetland views, over 3 miles of secluded hiking trails, and an impressive prairie restoration which provides a much-needed wildlife habitat preserve. We expect to see Swallowtails, Sulphurs, Blues, Crescents, Monarchs and Skippers, etc. nectaring at wildflowers. We will look for any stray immigrants from the South. Leaders are **Ginny Nelson** and **Pamela Skaar**.

Bring binoculars for butterfly viewing (the closer they can focus the better). We have a few extra binoculars. Wear long pants and a hat for protection from the sun. Wear sturdy walking shoes and bring water. Call Karl Legler at (608) 228-0743 only if you have a question about the trip, or if the weather is questionable.

DIRECTIONS: Meet at 10:00 a.m. in the parking lot for Yahara Heights. From the north side of Madison, head north on Hwy 113. Continue on Hwy 113, past the intersection with County M, for 1/3 mile. Turn right (east) onto River Road. Then turn right (south) at the next road (Catfish Court) and drive about 1/3 mile to the parking area on the left (east) side of the road. (This is north of the Dog Park parking lot.) The trail is accessible by a handicap scooter.

BUTTERFLIES OF THE AVOCA / BLUE RIVER AREA

Saturday, August 3, 2019

10:30 a.m.- 4 p.m.

In some years this can be the best butterfly trip of the year! This trip will highlight several areas in the Lower Wisconsin State Riverway, including Avoca Prairie and Savanna State Natural Area in Iowa County, and Blue River unit in Grant County. Leader is Dr. Douglas Buege. We expect to see late butterflies and several unusual southern immigrants. A hat and long pants are recommended. Bring water, a lunch,

and binoculars (the closer they focus the better). A few extra binoculars are available. Call Karl Legler at (608) 228-0743 only if you have a question about the trip, or if the weather is questionable. Meet at 10:30 a.m. Allow 50 minute travel time from Middleton. **DIRECTIONS:** Take Hwy 14 west to Lone Rock, south on Hwy

130 then turn right on Hwy 133. Go west about 5.0 miles, turn right on Hay Road, and drive north to the first parking area.

BUTTERFLIES OF THE SAUK-PRAIRIE RECREATION AREA NEW

Saturday, August 10, 2019

10:00 a.m. to noon

The Sauk Prairie Recreation Area, located in southeastern Sauk County, consists of a portion of the decommissioned 7,354-acre Badger Army Ammunition Plant (BAAP). The Sauk Prairie Recreation Area contributes important areas of grassland habitat needed to reconstruct a natural mosaic of prairie-savanna-woodland at a landscape scale. Directly adjacent to Devils Lake State Park, it serves

as an ecological transition from the Baraboo Hills to the Wisconsin River. This is a huge area! We hope to see about 20 species or more. Leaders are **Karl and Dorothy Legler**. A hat and long pants are recommended. Bring water and binoculars (the closer they focus the better). A few extra binoculars are available. Call Karl Legler at (608) 228-0743 only if you have a question about the trip, or if the weather is questionable.

Meet at 10:00 a.m. along the entrance road.

DIRECTIONS: From Middleton, take Hwy 12 to Sauk City. From the stoplight at the bridge over the Wisconsin River continue on Hwy 12 for 8.7 miles. Turn right at the sign for "Museum: Badger Army Ammunition" and meet along the road.

2 RECENT BUTTERFLIES REPORTED ON wisconsinbutterflies.org

The most notable recent observations of permanent residents were Mike Reese's two reports (June 21, July 6) of **Greenish Blue** which have been declining in recent years.

In the past month a small but increasing number of rare or very rare immigrants from the South and West have been reported. These cannot survive winter here but wander northward and breed in Wisconsin. Some are known to return south in the fall, e.g. Painted Lady, Red Admiral, Common Buckeye, etc.

Painted Lady has been fairly common (but not as common as American Lady).

5 JUST IN: BUTTERFLY FIELD DAYS at Fort McCoy, Saturday, July 27

"This is the first public opportunity to learn about and see some of the rare butterflies at the Fort McCoy military base in western WI (35 minutes east of La Crosse). As far as I know of, this property contains the last stronghold for Ottoe Skipper in the upper Midwest contained within it's 16,000 acres of somewhat connected high quality sand prairie/barrens/savanna habitat. It's not uncommon to have Gorgone Checkerspots, Regal Fritillaries, and Karner Blues all on the same pile of wolf scat. It's an amazing place floristically as well.

Two sessions to choose from: 9 a.m. - Noon or 1:00 p.m. to 4 p.m. Includes a presentation and a bus tour to the field to see butterflies (bring binoculars). Coordinated by Directorate of Public Works Environmental Division Natural Resources Branch. Call the Permit Sales Office at 608-388-3337 to resserve a spot for one of the sessions. There is no cost for attending this event. You should meet at Building 6058 at the Sparta/Fort McCoy Airport.
