1 2021 FIELD TRIPS REOPEN! 31st ANNUAL MADISON NABA BUTTERFLY COUNT Monday, July 5, 2021 9:00 - Noon

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Sponsored by the North American Butterfly Association (NABA). This is our 31st annual Madison butterfly count! Each year, butterfly enthusiasts all over North America participate in more than 450 NABA censuses of butterfly species. These censuses help to monitor the

health of our butterfly populations and the results are published in an annual report for North America. We will walk in the **UW's Grady Tract**, which has been greatly opened up, so it may attract more butterflies. Bring binoculars, the closer they focus the better. (We have a few extra binoculars.) Dress for protection from the heat and sun, a hat is recommended. Leaders are **Pam Skaar** and **Karl and Dorothy Legler**. The North American Butterfly Association (NABA) requires a **\$3.00 fee** from each participant to help cover publishing costs.

BUTTERFLIES OF THE AVOCA / BLUE RIVER AREA

Saturday, August 7, 2021 10:30 a.m.- 4 p.m.

In good years this can be the best butterfly trip of the year! This trip will highlight several areas in the **Lower Wisconsin State Riverway**, including Avoca Prairie and Savanna State Natural Area in Iowa County, and Blue River unit in Grant County. Leader is **butterfly expert**, **Mike Reese**. We expect to see late butterflies and several unusual southern immigrants. A hat and long pants are recommended. Bring water, a lunch, and binoculars (the

closer they focus the better). A few extra binoculars are available. (Call Karl Legler at (608) 228-0743 only if you have a question about the trip, or if the weather is questionable.)

Meet at 10:30 a.m. Allow 50 minute travel time from Middleton. **DIRECTIONS:** Take Hwy 14 west to Lone Rock, south on Hwy 130 then turn right on Hwy 133. Go west about 5.0 miles, turn right on Hay Road, and drive north to the first parking area.

2 SOME BUTTERFLIES REPORTED ON:

In 2020 we can see from the reports on wisconsinbutterflies.org what people were doing during the pandemic. The <u>number of butterfly reports in March, May, June and July 2020 exceeded the previous 2 "normal" years.</u> People were safer when they were outdoors and had more *time* to be outdoors. So more people noticed the butterflies and sent in reports.

Perhaps the most remarkable sighting was on April 7, 2021. A <u>Common Checkered Skipper</u> was seen in Prairie du Sac. That was a new record early date for Wisconsin. The previous early record for this species was May 16, 2012. We remember that one well because it was found on a SWBA field trip to Jackson County! It was at least 90 degrees and 2012 was a year that developed the worst drought in 25 years. It is probably no accident that this year's early sighting is also one of substantial drought. The Common Checkered Skipper is a stray and immigrants tend to flee drought areas if they can. We have severe drought to our west.

It seemed to us to be a good year for checkerspots. On NABA's Wazee (Spring) Count in Jackson Co., a group found hundreds of **Gorgone Checkerspots** at one intersection! Then in a trip to Yellowstone Lake we found a good population of **Silvery Checkerspots**. Finally we went up to Wood County Wildlife Area and found a number of **Harris' Checkerspots**. The Harris' Checkerspot is single-brooded and is flying now. The Gorgone Checkerspot has a 2nd brood in the second half of July, while the Silvery Checkerspots will have a second brood in late August to early September.

3 2020 MUD LAKE NABA BUTTERFLY COUNT

Last year, on July 3, 2020, SWBA counted butterflies within the 15 mile diameter "Mud Lake" circle and Madison Audubon counted butterflies at their Goose Pond Sanctuary. Altogether, it was an excellent count. A record 30 counters, in 6 parties, counted for a total of 29.8 party-hours of observation and found 1,050 butterflies of 34 species. The Monarch (281) was the most abundant species, primarily because of thorough counting at Goose Pond (extensive milkweed.) Similarly for Black Swallowtail (75), Clouded Sulphur (216), and Common Wood Nymph (127). Elsewhere in the circle, Tawny Emperor (12) had a good year! The total number of butterfly species found within this circle, over the 32 years, is 69! Below is the full list of 2020 results:
